The Junior Artist Ages 8-12

By the age of 12, children's minds are developing the ability to think more abstractly and 3-dimensionally. You will find they enjoy ideas of metaphor, irony, and hidden meanings. This is the time to focus on the details as the Junior Artist begins to work from realist subject matter such as still life settings and photographs. If desired, students may work in the classic tradition of the "art reproduction" where they will paint a replica of a favorite Master paining, just as the Masters before them did. The goal is to develop versatility in still life, landscape, and basic portraiture. Selecting and caring for specifically-chosen art materials becomes important at this stage, and advanced students will begin to develop their own creative projects.


The Primary Artist Ages 5-7

Young children are natural artists. They have a wonderful sense of colour and balance. Unfortunately, by the time they reach grade one, they have also developed an elaborate collection of simple symbolic figures that are very helpful in math and science class, but not as helpful in depicting the "real" world in a work of art.

The modern curriculum is geared to developing this linear thinking model, while the creative lateral thinking skills are relegated to the realm of the "extracurricular." In a given school year, it is not unusual if up to 30% of students are struggling with this linear mode of learning. This is particularly true of young boys, and manifests itself most often as difficulties in reading and writing. The good news is that incorporating drawing and painting into your child's education program will greatly enhance problem-solving skills and the development of both types of thinking. It is not unusual for a child's grades to pick up in all areas after a few weeks of Classical art instruction.

A slightly simpler version of the adult program, your child will learn to draw in line, followed by tone, then colour, and will explore shapes, textures, spaces, perspective, edges, stories, and ideas. The primary focus is in establishing a safe, nurturing creative environment where your child can freely explore a variety of tools and media. Over time, he or she will have gained an entirely new vocabulary and a new-found sense of competence and accomplishment.





The Adult Artist Ages 13-59

By this stage of development, it becomes important to group students into 3 categories, depending on experience.

The Foundation Student is a beginner or wishes to review the fundamentals of drawing and painting. Students will develop technical accuracy while working in a variety of drawing media. Concepts of form, space, perspective and shape are formally explored before moving into advanced concepts of tone, composition and mood. Still life settings are used to develop versatility in landscape, still life and basic portraiture. Adults 18 and over may attend life-drawing classes if desired.

The Intermediate Student will be quite proficient in representational drawing by this point. Painting skills become a primary focus as students become actively involved in designing their own projects within the genres of still life, landscape and more advanced portraiture and figure drawing. More advanced concepts include stylistic considerations regarding medium, realism, impressionism, abstraction and application. Emphasis shifts to colour theory, theme development and advanced composition and creativity.

The Advanced Student is fairly skilled and highly motivated to achieve some level of professional development. Projects become self-directed, with a particular focus on end-product finish quality. This level is necessarily demanding, with emphasis on art theory and the meaning-making aspect of image making. Students should be proficient in a wide variety of tools and materials, and are encouraged to explore mixed media projects, including printmaking, photography, soft sculpture and the like. Students may discuss the possibility of solo and group shows with their facilitator.

For Moms & Tots This is a fantastic way to bond with your babies and very young children. Bring a friend or a grandparent for a full hour of fun while learning to paint fingers and faces, and probably the table and your clothes! No worries... no toxic materials involved. We cannot guarantee you won't leave with a few stains, however, so be sure to wear appropriate clothing. You will leave with a finished piece of art at the end of every class.

Portfolio Development

This is a specialized program to assist in the development of a professional-looking portfolio for those interested in applying for a visual or applied art program. Students will produce a combination of instructional and self-directed assignments. The best of these will be photographed and compiled for submission to the school of choice, based on specific program requirements.

Life-Drawing

Drawing the human figure is the most advanced of all the artistic bents. Hence, why it can be so difficult to find in local community venues! Learn to draw the human form. Both semi-draped and fully nude sessions are available on request. Adults 18 and over, please. No photography permitted.
